

ALL NATIONS' ARE TOO MUCH FOR MOHAMIS'

Win Afternoon Game by Score of 10 to 1.
Evening Game Also Won By Visitors.

The Mohami and the All Nations' baseball teams clashed at Oliver Park yesterday in two very one-sided games which proved featureless only for a home run by Piteher Means of the visitors in the second inning with one man on base and a stolen base by Myers of the home team.

Poor base running by the home team and evidently the lack of regular practice was the cause of some very costly errors, and, although the visitors made nine hits during the game, the score could have been less had the errors and poor judgment in base running been cut to a minimum by the home team. Fans who have followed the home team mutually agree that it was by far the poorest exhibition of baseball shown by the Mohami team this year. The visitors are given credit for playing a clean-cut game and showed plenty of vim to play in strong company. Miss Carrie Nation at first base played an exceptionally fine game, displaying skill and nerve that are unusual to feminine nature.

Her pleasant remarks, which are half the make up of a good ball player, met with favor from the cheering fans who witnessed the game.

The second game, which was scheduled for 8:30 p. m., was called at 9 p. m. amid a glare of flaming arc lights. A small gathering of fans enjoyed the novelty of night baseball, which was played under indoor regulations.

The paraphernalia used in the night game consisted of regulation ball and bat as used in playing indoor baseball.

The Mohami team, in spite of no practice at this class of baseball, made a creditable showing, but scores were few and far between, as in the afternoon game and which the summary below will indicate.

The line-up for both games remained the same, with the exception of Fargo, a feminine player, who covered right field for the visitors in the evening game.
