

The 1912 baseball season at Jamestown was terminated Friday with two interesting games, one in the afternoon when Jamestown defeated the All Nations 13 to 1, while the final contest, a game of "indoor" baseball played at the ball park last night under gas lights was won by the touring team 4 to 2. Large crowds turned out for both games, and the novel contest in the evening was especially interesting and amusing, the boys performing many ludicrous stunts in their pursuit of the big, soft indoor baseball.

Friday afternoon, with Hanson on the mound, Jamestown overwhelmed the All Nations, hitting the visitors' pitcher at will. Hanson would have pitched a shut-out but for an error in the last inning, which let in the visitors' only run. On account of Jamestown's having no regular catcher, the All Nations loaned a backstop for the game, who made a great showing behind the bat and with the stick. He brought in two runs himself, and in the same inning early in the game Jamestown clinched the contest when with three men on base Jim Hoyle drove out a home run. The locals kept the scorer busy from then on.

Friday night an immense crowd was attracted to the ball park to witness the unique game of baseball under artificial lights, and all were well entertained. "Dolly" Elder pitched for the locals, with Hanson behind the bat, and the players got into the game in a manner that brought shrieks of delight from the bleachers, sidelines and grandstand. The All Nations had two girls in their lineup. The All Nations nine has found great favor with the Jamestown crowd on account of their fast, clean playing and sportsmanlike conduct.
