

All-Nations 7, Hankinson 0.

That far-famed All-Nation baseball team, with the mighty Donaldson in the box shut out Hankinson Tuesday afternoon in a well played game, clearly featured by the wonderful pitching of ye colored south-paw. Donaldson had the home boys at his mercy during the entire session and allowed only two hits, one of which was the veriest scratch and due to the muddy condition of the field. Aln connected for a clean single to left field in the eighth inning but this gained the locals nothing.

The game marked the return of George W. Rennie to pitching duty and the "Old Warhorse" certainly did himself proud, allowing but 11 hits and striking out seven of the professionals. Rex's throwing hand was injured

in the third by a fast grounder from Donaldson's bat, but he held to the ball and started the play to second which resulted in a double, and continued the pitching duties to the end of the game. Two bad errors in the first inning resulted in three runs for the visitors without a hit, but barring this one inning the locals played superb ball. R. Green retired the first two men up at first. Then Tenner dropped Mendez' pop fly and Reeves walked. Donaldson hit a high fly to right field which Barrett muffed, Mendez and Reeves scoring. Dunbar dumped one in front of the plate which Rex threw wide at first, Donaldson scoring. The next man was an easy out. — But for this series of mis-plays, the score would have been 4 to 0, but we are perfectly satisfied and would like the privilege of seeing the game in which the All-Nations are beaten with Donaldson in the box.
