

Pilots to Race for Red Grange Trophy Here July 5

GRID STAR PUTS UP FINE TROPHY

Gold and Silver Cup Goes to Winner of Sweepstakes.

Red Grange, idol of thousands of American sports fans, will put up the Red Grange trophy for the winner of the sweepstakes event of the American legion auto races, to be run at the Interstate Fair track Monday, July 5.

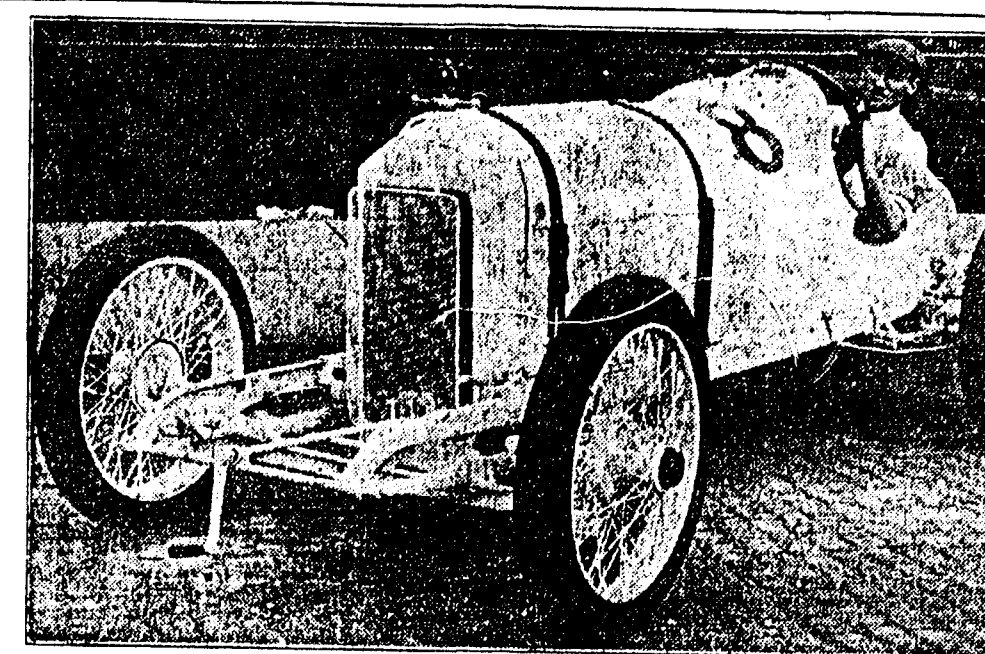
Arrangements were completed by wire today whereby the red-headed football star will donate a gorgeous silver and gold prize for the final event, which will be called the Red Grange sweepstakes. The trophy will be similar to the one which Grange presented for the Memorial day classic at Ascot speedway, Los Angeles, and since it can be built from the same mold, will be ready to ship to Sioux City the first of next week, so that it may be exhibited for several days prior to the event.

A wire from Grange yesterday, definitely announcing he will award the prize, finished negotiations that have been under way for several weeks. It started when one legionaire suggested that permission be obtained from Grange to name the big race of the day in his honor. After several letters, Grange said he not only would submit his name, but would procure and present another trophy if the legionaires thought well of the idea.

His wire from the coast yesterday completed the final arrangements.

With assurance of Grange's award, legionaires are going after even greater stars for the Independence day races, and yesterday advised several pilots by wire. They are particularly anxious to get an entry from Archie Lamplin, king of the championship dirt track leaders. Lamplin, already entered with his Miller special, a speedway job, while Johnny Watters, the Dixie champion, and Cleo Sarles, Iowa title holder, are also among the assured starters.

GAME OF GOLF IS ENJOYED BY THE SWEDISH PRINCE

Chicago, June 26.—(AP)—The crown prince of Sweden played 14 holes of golf today on the old Elm course, and appeared to enjoy it perhaps more than any other event since his arrival in Chicago four days ago. The prince cut out the holes between 11 and 16 in order to be on time for his visit to the Swedish Old Peoples home in Evanston.

His golf partners were James Simpson, president of Marshall Field and company, McCormick Blair and C. H. Schweppe. The prince had his own clubs and brought in a pastebored suit, a gray street suit which he boxed for the links. His first drive had a pronounced hook, landing him in the rough, but he played out fairly well on his second, was on the green in four down with one putt. On the first nine, he scored a 57, par is 36. He registered seven on each of the five holes he played on the second nine, evidently hastening his shots somewhat.

Rock Island, Ill., June 26.—(AP)—Perhaps the most enthusiastic welcome accorded Crown Prince Gustavus Adolphus and Crown Princess Louise of Sweden since their arrival in America, awaits them here tomorrow, the center of the Swedish Lutheran church and education in this country. Augustana college and theological seminary is one of the principal points of interest for the crown prince on his tour, since the institution from its inception 66 years ago has been highly regarded within the royal circle of Sweden.

The royal couple and party will arrive from Chicago at 6:35 a. m., but will remain aboard their train until 7:30 o'clock. At that hour the official reception committee, headed by Dr. G. A. Brandegee, president of Augustana synod, and including the mayors of Rock Island, Moline and Davenport, will arrive at the station to become the escort of the future king and queen of Sweden.
