

# HAVE "STARS" WITH THEM

**All Nations Baseball Club Comprised  
Of Players, Who Could Make Good  
In Major Leagues—Donaldson,  
Colored Pitcher, One of Best.**

The first game of the doubleheader to be played in this city between the All Nations Baseball club and the Chicago Union Giants was started yesterday afternoon at the local ball park and progressed for an inning and a half when the teams were forced to retire from the field on account of the rain. The game started with the All Nations in the field. During

the time of play no score was registered for either side.

This afternoon the teams again cross bats and a big crowd was expected to be in attendance.

The All Nations team, as well as the Giants, is a good drawer, for its record for this year is a good one. With the All Nations are such players as John Donaldson, who could be pitching in the Major Leagues, as he is recognized to be one of the best pitchers in the country; Jose Mendez, of Cuba, who plays shortstop on the team and also has some repute as a pitcher of no mean ability; Mendez is from the All Stars baseball team of Cuba. Frank Blatiner, who is a full blooded Indian, plays second base for the All Nations, and is also recognized as one of the best players of the National Pastime outside of the big leagues.

Omaha, The All Nations Club shut out the Storz Triumphs by the score of 1 to 0, Donaldson, who pitched for the former, fanning, in the last inning, three men with nine balls thrown.
