handled the Albert Lea Tigers a solid defeat behind the pitching of John Donaldson. The great lefty kept the locals off balance by allowing nine safe hits, while striking out 13. Donaldson's home run was also a feature of the game. Donaldson's receiver that day was Carrol "Dink" Mothell. Both Mothell and Donaldson shared in the brotherhood of black baseball during the segregated era. Ironically when both passed away they were relegated to unmarked graves, Donaldson in suburban Chicago and Mothell in Topeka, Kansas. The Negro Leagues Grave Marker Project sought and gained proper headstones for both players. Now this famous battery can be remembered for their tremendous careers not the absence of proper burial plots. --The Donaldson Network
