

# STORZ LOSE FIRST GAME, TIE SECOND

In Opener the All-Nations Play  
Shutout Ball, Score  
Is 1 to 0.

Rally in Second Contest Puts  
Brewers on Even Footing.  
Ended by Darkness.

Taking everything into consideration,  
such as brilliant fielding plays, sensa-  
tional twirling and clever work on the  
base paths, the largest amount of base-

ball ever dealt out by the Storz-Triumphs occurred Sunday at Rourke park, when the All-Nations and the local semi-pro club clashed in a double affray. The cosmopolitan visitors nabbed the first game by a 1 to 0 score, while the second game ended in a 0 to 6 tie that went ten rounds, when play was called on account of the darkness.

The troublesome All-Nations certainly placed a crimp in the Brewers' hopes during the past two days. They came within an ace of copping the second contest, but the Storz indulged in one of their old rallies and tied the count.

It will be a long time before that first battle will be forgotten by the huge multitudes. Jawn Wesley Donaldson came within a hair of smashing all pitching records. That black boy's paw played havoc with the Brewer batsmen. Nineteen whiffed the ozone and but one was able to see first.

Jack Fugate was opposed to the sensational colored boy, and let it be said that "Carson" Jack twirled a very effective game. He fanned fourteen of the

visitors and gave some exhibitions of excellent pitching in tight places. Up to the fifth he was as good as Donaldson in retiring the opposition on strikes.

The All-Nations garnered their lone tally in the fifth frame. Mendez, the irrefragable Cuban, who was in the thick of the fray during the entire day, hit a fast one to short that bounced off Lawler's glove. Elder fanned, but Blatner hit a Texas leaguer over second and Mendez, by a burst of speed, reached third, from whence he scored on Moore's hit.

The second battle found Olson and Benson opposed to each other. Olson was the victim of poor support, aided a trifle by his tendency to puncture the visitors in the ribs.

Next Sunday the Storz and Merchants of Council Bluffs will meet in the rubber game at Merchants park.
