

WHITE SOX LOSE TO ALL NATIONS

A Good Ball Game is Witnessed at
Riverside Park Notwith-
standing the Heavy
Diamond.

SOX LOSE THROUGH ERRORS

The Score is 3 to 7—Large Attend-
ance—Yesterday's Game Closes
Season.

A large crowd of fans witnessed the ball game at Riverside park yesterday afternoon when the White Sox and the All-Nations tried conclusions. The diamond was heavy but notwithstanding this fact, a good game was played. Peterson started in to pitch for the home team but was hit with a batted ball in the second inning and compelled to retire, Smith taking his place. The Sox lost the contest through errors, the score standing 3 to 7.

Yesterday afternoon's game closes the ball season in this city.

In the second inning the visitors started the fireworks, when Brattner reached first on an error by Corbin. Brandell hit safely and on Dunlap's put out stole home. 1 hit, 1 run.

In the fourth, Corbin, first up, brought in first count for the Sox with a home run clout over the west fence. Sucher beat out an infield tap in this inning, but failed to get around the circuit.

In the fifth, Graves of the visitors hit safely and was sacrificed to second by Mendez. Donaldson scored the big pitcher with a single over Corbin's head. Cline also hit safely, but Brattner's fan out retired the side. 3 hits, 1 run.

In the seventh inning Thompson, on a hard chance, allowed Mendez to take first. Smith then threw wild in an attempt to catch the visiting short fielder off first, with the result that the base runner went to second. Donaldson with a safety brought Mendez in, but the round closed on put outs of Cline and Brattner. 1 hit, 1 run.

In the eighth, the Sox scored one more run. Fromme, first up, walked and Thompson was given first through an error by Mendez. A double steal allowed Fromme to cross the plate. No hits, 1 run.

In the first of the ninth, two errors gave the visitors their victory. Mendez reached first on an error by DeCamp. Crowe was given a base when Holm threw wild to Thompson, and Mendez crossed the plate on Corbin's error. Donaldson went out, Fromme to Holm, but Cline hit for one base. Brattner cleaned up with a home run over the left field fence. Dunbar, with a single, scored Brattner. 3 hits, 4 runs.

In the latter half of the ninth the White Sox took new life, when Holm hit the second one over for

two bases. Sucher was allowed first base on an error by Cline, and Fromme made a single, scoring Holm and sending Sucher to third. Smith, however, struck out, closing the game.
