A large crowd was out Tuesday to see the celebrated Donaldson pitch. This colored man has the reputation of being the best pitcher in base ball today. He worked the first four innings, and was effective, although Brown secured two safe hits, one of which would have been a homer but for the ground rules, limiting to two bases. The Nations secured their lone tally in the fourth frame, on two hits off Lotz, who was working for the Indians. The Nations made three straight hits in this inning, but fast fielding kept them from tallying more than one run. In the fifth, Ludwig lead off with a clean two bagger, Eberts was hit by the pitcher, Ludwig went to third on a balk, and scored on a fielder's choice off Welch's hit to short. Eberts scored a moment later with a beautiful hook slide, on a fielder's choice off Askland's infield drive, and two more came across on Brown's sacrifice fly, and a bad throw to the plate by the center fielder. The game ended 4 to 1 in favor of the locals. Lotz pitched a nice game, allowing but seven hits, and striking out eleven men. One error was chalked up to Williams, but cut no figure in the scoring.
