## THE DEVILS LOST A PAIR

**The All-Nation Base Ball Club Trimmed the Colored Athletes in Both Games at Electric Park.**

The All-Nations Base Ball Club representing the Schmeltzer Arms Co., of Kansas City, Mo., invaded the Devils' Domain Saturday and Sunday and succeeded in wresting a series of two games from them. Saturday's game was poorly attended, it being Iola's busy day, but Sunday's crowd taxed the capacity of the Grand Stand, Chianute sending a delegation of about sixty fans.

Donaldson, the star twirler for the All-Nation Club was doing slab duty for the visitors and was nicked for fourteen blows in Saturday's battle

and while "Bad Eye" Jackson, the Devil's choice was touched for only seven safe ones, his support was very wobbly, errors being responsible for their defeat by an 8 to 7 score.

Sunday dawned bright and sunny, but by mid-day clouds had marred the heavens and J. Pluvius began his attempt to cross, the weather forecaster and while he made feeble efforts during the entire performance was unable to break up the show. For the second exhibition, Jacobs, the pitcher from the land of the rising sun and Harper were the opposing moundsmen and while Jacobs traversed the entire route, Harold took the reins in the eighth for the local aggregation and with the aid of his mates retired them in one, two, three order.
