

ALL NATIONS WIN 6 TO 3 OVER C. B.

FULLY 800 PEOPLE SEE GREAT
GAME ON THE FOURTH
OF JULY.

VISITORS WIN IN THE 8TH

All-Nations Catcher Hits Home Run
With Men on Bases—Donaldson
Pitches to One Man, and
Strikes Him Out.

BLANKED CORNING, 2 TO 0.

On last Thursday the All-Nations shut out Corning, champions of southwestern Iowa, by the score of 2 to 0. Donaldson held the champs to one hit.

Exactly 748 persons paid admission to Broadway park Tuesday afternoon to see the All-Nations, crack traveling aggregation, down the local "All-Stars" by the score of 6 to 3, in an

interesting contest. Counting the officials, the "kids" and the players themselves there were easily 800 people present, which set a new record for the season and would compare favorably with the crowds which attended the southwestern Iowa tournament last year. The Council Bluffs end of the receipts Tuesday will go toward paying for the canvass fence which has been erected, the local players having donated their services gratis in this game.

As for the game itself Council Bluffs battled bravely, and for a time it appeared as though they might win out. But Forman, husky catcher for the visitors, dashed all hopes to the ground in the eighth inning when with two men on and one down he lofted a homer over the left field canvass. It cleared the eight-foot ball with plenty to spare.

The All-Nations used Hamilton in the box, thereby disappointing some of the local folk who had hoped the mighty Donaldson would be on the firing line. The great colored hurler relieved Hamilton in the sixth long enough to pitch to one batter, however, when Council Bluffs was in the midst of a rally, having filled the bases with none down. Donaldson, who is a southpaw, did not resort to his terrific speed, but by merely using a change of pace struck out Heath, following which he returned to first base. Hamilton then resumed the mound duty and retired the side, but not until two runs had been scored.

Local Outfield Busy.

The Council Bluffs outfield of Shea, Lockwood and Heath gave a credit-

able performance in the gardens, nailing nine flies between them. Lockwood and Shea getting four apiece while the crippled Heath limped up and took one that nobody thought he could reach. Shea made a dive after a liner in the second inning and fell to the ground and rolled over, but held onto the ball. Jack's catch was one of the features of the game. Left Fielder Linder of the visitors took a short fly off his shoe-tops in the seventh inning for the final out, checking a threatened rally and robbing Wolcott of a hit.

Dick Richards was in the box for Council Bluffs, and he did heroic work after an unsteady start. A walk, a sacrifice and two singles gave the visitors their first two runs in the opening inning.

From then on until the sixth there were no more scores, Hamilton holding the locals almost helpless. In the first half of the sixth Rip Young committed the only error of his team, and it permitted the All-Nations to score their third run. In the last half Council Bluffs woke up and filled the bases with none down on an error, a pass and a bunt to third which Young beat out in the most approved rabbit fashion. Here it was that Donaldson took over the pitching assignment, and Heath fell a strikeout victim. Hamilton then returned to the box. Young scored on a passed ball, and Swingwood also marked when Phil-

lips lofted a long fly to center. Shea struck out, ending the scoring.

With the score 3 to 2, the locals entered into the seventh full of fight, and put the visitors out in short order. Lockwood was safe on an error in the last half, but Young popped to short, Richards struck out and Wolcott was robbed out of a hit when Linder caught his short fly.

In the eighth the All-Nations practically cinched the game. Anderson started it all by getting a line-drive single past Phillips. Mendez grounded out, but Donaldson laid down a perfect bunt and beat it out with ease. Forman then ruined the locals' hopes of victory by swatting the pill over the left-field canvass for a home run, scoring both men ahead of him.

One run was made by Council Bluffs in the last half when Swingwood singled. Heath was safe on an error and Shea shot a single over the third baseman's head. The ninth was devoid of excitement and the game ended, 6 to 3. The box score:
